Write a diary entry imagining that you are a soldier living and fighting in the trenches. Think about the daily tasks you would have to do and how you would feel living in danger and far from home.</p>
<p>It's dinner time! Research rationing. Create a daily menu for what a family could eat using the food you're allowed in your ration. Remember, you could grow your own vegetables too! This can be done on paper or on a computer.</p>	<p>Cat walk!</p> <p>Research the sorts of clothing that would be worn during World War Two. Draw somebody wearing these clothes, labelling the different types of clothing and describing what these were like.</p>	<p>Where in the world?</p> <p>Research and find on a map countries involved in World War Two. You could colour code these countries to show which side they fought for.</p>
<p>Who's who? Research some of the key people associated with World War Two and what they are known for. Record this information in any way that you like.</p>	<p>Word work</p> <p>Find definitions for: artillery, munitions, Zeppelins, rationing, propaganda, social, political and cultural. Create a glossary explaining these terms.</p>	<p>Book worm</p> <p>Visit your local library and find some non-fiction books about World War Two. Start a fact file which you can add to as the term goes on.</p>
