

Maltese Road Primary School admission arrangements for 2026-2027

Introductory statement

Maltese Road Primary School is an academy within The Eveleigh LINK Academy Trust committed to raising education standards within Chelmsford and Maldon.

From 1st April 2022 Maltese Road Primary School manages all mid-year transfer applications. Any parent applying for a mid-year transfer must send the school's official application form (available from the school website) to admin@maltese.essex.sch.uk. On receipt of an application, the school will respond to the parent within 15 school working days. **Please note that this will mean that an application made in the school holidays will not be processed until the start of the school term.** If there are spaces in the year group, an offer will be made. If the year group is full, a refusal letter will be sent along with information about how to appeal. When there are more applications received than the number of places available, the school's published admissions criteria will be used to determine any offers that can be made. The school will keep a waiting list and offer places following the published admissions oversubscription criteria (see below).

Admission number(s)

The academy has an admission number of 30 for entry into the reception class every year.

The academy will accordingly admit this number of pupils each year if there are sufficient applications. Where fewer applicants than the published admission number(s) for the relevant year group are received, the Academy Trust will offer places at the academy to all those who have applied.

Oversubscription criteria

When the academy is oversubscribed, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below, in priority order:

1. Looked after children and children who were previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to adoption, a child arrangements order, or special guardianship order.
2. Children with a sibling attending the school excluding the final year
3. Other Children by straight line distance

Definition of siblings

A relevant sibling is a child who has a brother, sister, adopted brother or sister or stepbrother or stepsister living in the same family unit, in the same family household and address, who attends the preferred school in any year group excluding the final year. Biological and adopted siblings who attend the preferred school in any year group excluding the final year will also be treated as siblings, irrespective of place of residence. Children residing in the same household as part of an extended family, such as cousins, will not be treated as siblings. For mid-year applications the only variation to the definition above is the child should be attending, or has been offered a place at, the preferred

school at the time of application and determination and with a reasonable expectation that the sibling will be attending at the time of admission. Biological siblings who attend the preferred school will be treated as siblings irrespective of their place of residence.

Priority Admission areas

There is no guarantee of a place to children living in the priority admission area of a particular school. Details, including maps of priority admission areas are available on request from School Admissions.

Distance tie breaker

All straight line distances are calculated electronically by the LA using data provided jointly by the Post Office and Ordnance Survey. The data plots the co-ordinates of each property and provides the address-point between which straight line distance is measured and reported to three decimal places. In the unlikely event of two applicants with an identical distance competing for a single place at a school the place will be offered to one applicant on the basis of lots drawn by an officer of the admission authority not involved in admissions. If in category 3 above a tie-break is necessary to determine which child is admitted, the child living closest to the school will be given priority for admission. Distance (using the local authority's agreed measuring criteria) is measured from the child's home (where they reside permanently) to the school in a straight line. This will be proven by, for example, the address used to register the child with a GP or the address where child benefit is paid to. If two children's homes are exactly the same distance away then lots will be drawn and supervised by an independent person. If a child's time is split equally between two residences, the address of the residence closest to the school would be used to measure the distance between the child's school and home.

Late applications

All applications received by the Local Authority after the deadline will be considered to be late applications. Late applications will be considered after those received on time. If, following consideration of all applicants the school is oversubscribed, parents may request that their child is placed on the school's waiting list.

Deferred entry for infants

Essex County Council's (The LA) policy is that children born on and between 1 September 2022 and 31 August 2023 would normally commence primary school in Reception in the academic year beginning in September 2026.

As required by law, all Essex infant and primary schools provide for the full-time admission of all children offered a place in the Reception year group from the September following their fourth birthday. Therefore, if a parent wants a full-time place for their child from September (at the school at which a place has been offered) then they are entitled to that full-time place.

Parents can request that the date their child is admitted to school is deferred until later in the school year or until the child reaches compulsory school age in the school year. The law does not require a child to start school until the start of the term following their fifth birthday. Compulsory school age is reached at that point. Where entry is deferred, the school will hold the place for that child and not offer it to another child. The parent would not however be able to defer entry beyond the beginning of the term after the child's fifth birthday, nor beyond the academic year for which the original application was accepted.

Parents can also request that their child attends part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age. Any parents interested in taking up a part-time place initially should contact the individual school(s) for further details as to what this would entail.

Where parents choose to defer entry, a school may reasonably expect that the child would start at the beginning of a new school term/half term.

Where a parent of a 'summer-born' child (1st April – 31st August) wishes their child to start school in the Reception class in the autumn term following their fifth birthday, they must submit a statement informing the Executive Headteacher of the school as to the reasons why that they are requesting a deferral. This statement may be accompanied by further evidence and documents from other professionals working with the child. This is to be sent to the Headteacher by 18th December 2026. The admission authority (The Eveleigh LINK Academy Trust) will then decide whether the application for a Reception place will be accepted or whether it will be treated as an application for a Year 1 place, the child's normal age appropriate cohort. The decision will be communicated to parents/carers on or before 15th January 2027 allowing time for an application to be made within the normal application procedure timings. If the request is granted, parents/carers must email admissions@essex.gov.uk by 11th January 2027 and attach a copy of the admission authority's letter and supporting evidence. We strongly recommend that parents/carers read the Essex admissions booklet that is located on the school's website.

Medical circumstances

Exceptional medical reasons why a child should attend a particular school will override other admission criteria (other than Looked After Children) if supported by medical evidence at the time of application but will not override the published admission number (PAN). The relevant medical reasons may be in relation to either the child or one or both parents. Applicants must provide evidence from a doctor or other registered health professional setting out why the preferred school is the most suitable, and the difficulties that would be caused if the child attended and had to travel to another school.

Where a parent asks for exceptional medical circumstances to be taken into account in connection with a mid-year application those circumstances will only be considered where it is necessary to rank applications in priority order, for example, where more than one applicant for a single space has been received and one of those applicants has stated exceptional medical circumstances. The admission authority will consider medical grounds once this has been received from the local authority at a meeting of the admission committee.

Waiting lists

School Admissions will hold a waiting list for all oversubscribed schools and passes this back to the school at the start of the autumn term. Places will continue to be allocated from this lists if spaces become available. Applicants will be ranked on these waiting lists in priority order, according to the school's admission criteria. The waiting list will be reordered in accordance with the oversubscription criteria whenever anyone is added to or leaves the waiting list.

Appeals against admission decisions

Parents have the right to appeal against admission decisions to an Independent Appeal Panel. Information about how to appeal against a refusal of a school place is available on the ECC website.
